The time after treatment for cancer is often called 'survivorship'. Getting used to life after cancer can take some time. Many people say cancer changes them and that they feel different, even if they look the same.

Like any therapy, Head and Neck Cancer treatment has side effects. Some side effects of Head and Neck Cancer stop after treatment. Others may last for some time. Some side effects of Head and Neck Cancer treatment can last the rest of your life.

Getting support and having a strong social network is important and can help with depression, anxiety and your overall health and wellbeing.
